Celebrating three years of growth & service

- In August, 2007 Sanctuary One became a 501(c)3 nonprofit. After months of site visits and due diligence, Lloyd M. Haines purchased Double Oak Farm in December, 2007 and began investing in property development.
- In March, 2008 the Sanctuary began serving the community as a care farm, a place of healing for people, animals, and the earth.
- Currently, 43 rescued farm animals and pets are living at the Sanctuary. Twenty-five more have been rescued, then adopted out to good, loving homes, bringing our total to 68 animals healed and saved.
- More than 350 people have made a donation to the Sanctuary. Not counting our founding donor, the largest donation has been \$11,000. Twenty-five supporters have given \$1,000 or more. Many more have made in-kind gifts.
- We have begun preparing the soil for the Upper Applegate Community Garden, our effort to grow food for the local food bank using sustainable and organic methods.
- Volunteers have travelled far to work at the Sanctuary, including a woman from Russia, several Canadians, and lots of young adults from the East Coast. These interns have experienced positive transformation in their lives by visiting and working at the Sanctuary.
- We've secured support and guidance from 9 foundations: Ford Family Foundation, Gordon Elwood Foundation, Cow Creek Umpqua Indian Foundation, Thalden Foundation, Gardner Grout Foundation, Bland Family Foundation, The Hundredth Monkey, Petco Foundation, and Wal-Mart Foundation.
- We've established collaborations with schools, law-enforcement agencies, animal sanctuaries and rescue groups, Southern Oregon Child Study & Treatment Center, Lithia Springs Boys Program, Jackson County Animal Shelter, Jackson County Community Justice, Mediation Works, World Wide Opportunities on Organic Farms, the Boy Scouts, and more.

What is permaculture?



Double Oak Farm is dedicated to the principle of **permaculture**. Permaculture is an approach to designing human settlements and agricultural systems that mimic the relationships found in natural ecologies. Permaculture distills ideas from multiple disciplines—ecology, energy conservation, landscape design, and environmental science, among others—to create natural, sustainable living environments that benefit all living beings. Big thanks are due Gene Griffith and his Permaculture Design Certification classmates for volunteering to help create a permaculture design for Double Oak Farm.

Upper Applegate Community Garden

We're pleased to announce that our manager of farming operations, Gene Griffith, has begun the groundwork to establish the Upper Applegate Community Garden, our fledgling effort to grow food for the local food bank.



Step 1, a large garden of strawberries and companion plants is being established near the farm house.

Step 2, Gene will turn 5 acres of pasture into a "food forest" replete with lots of edible, medicinal, and earth-restoring plants.

Meanwhile, Gene will be studying the lay of the land and designing more and bigger garden and crop areas to be established in the future.
